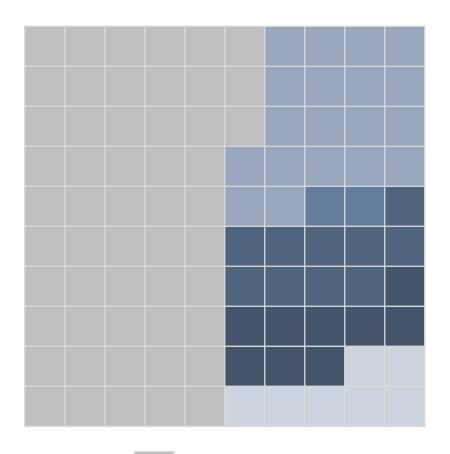

19% First learned about these services at the library

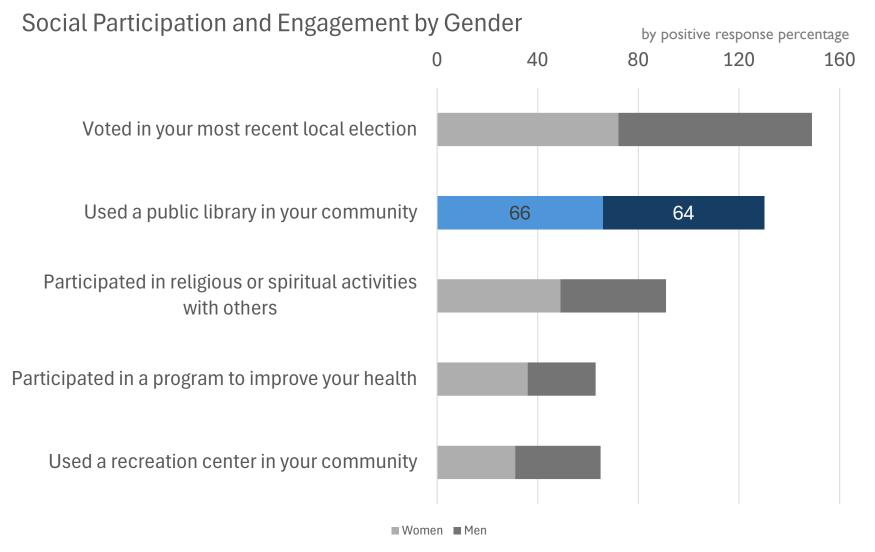

Alsip-Merrionette Public Library: Tech Literacy Part I

84-year-old retired teacher F attended several AgeOptions-sponsored classes recently, including Safe Online Selling, Computer Spring Cleaning, Save Money Online, and Smartphone Photography 101.

Empowered by the knowledge she gained from attending these classes, F wanted to start a small business selling clothes on Poshmark. She scheduled a one-on-one session with one of our librarians to review the skills she needed to become an online seller: using her phone's camera, editing and uploading images, and setting up her online account.

Alsip-Merrionette Public Library: Tech Literacy Part II Several weeks later at another tutorial, F shared that she thought she might be the victim of fraud in one of her Poshmark transactions. Staff helped F identify how the scammer had targeted and manipulated her and then worked with her to secure her account and prevent future breaches. F's experience has prompted staff to plan more programs to educate older adults on fraud prevention.

Initially introduced during the COVID-19 pandemic, we have continued to offer these kits thanks to a subscription with Activity Connections, funded by the Age Options grant. This subscription ensures we have fresh, engaging content each month.

These kits provide our patrons with opportunities to enhance cognitive functions and take a break from technology. While many of the kits are picked up by regular patrons, we also see new faces from the community who come specifically to get a kit. This initiative has proven to be a wonderful way for us to connect with the older members of our community.

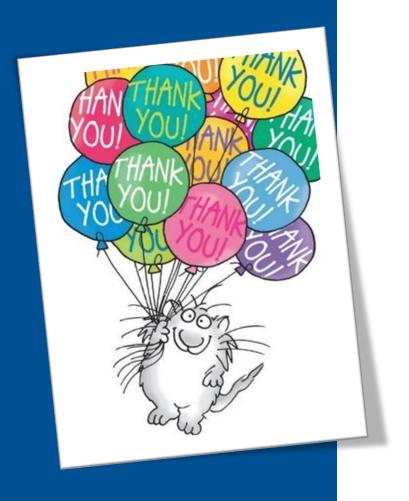
