


FY25 Reporting Form



Social Seniors Trivia started in March 2024 and has quickly grown in popularity among a core group of senior patrons.

We have modeled our program after popular trivia nights by featuring a librarian host, themed questions, and game show music. There are multiple rounds of questions with varying difficulty, ending with a Jeopardy-style final question where participants can wager points and win fun, whimsical prizes.

Attendees often banter and joke while figuring out the answers. One participant remarked, "I'd never thought I'd learn so much playing trivia."

Tinley Park Public Library

Our older adult patrons love coming to the library for our special daytime programs. Each month, we have a teast one aftermoon performance, a workshop, or an educational lecture. These classes are in very high demand, and the excitement [of the older adults] is amplified when they learn they can schedule a one-on-one appointment to further their learning.

Forest Park Public Library

We used Wit's Workout for the first time this Quarter. Staff member Dennis facilitated this engaging program. We were a bit uncertain jabout jub with sinew pambit would go over with our crown. The Social Circle enjoyed it, to the point where you could see the neurons bopping around under the furrowed brows as people made new connections, tested their memories, laughed and joked and told stories. One patron who'd come for the first time (L.V.) loved the program and has become a regular in the weeks since, stating that the library is a "magnet" for him.

Markham Public Library

Some of my new seniors have met new friends here in the programs. These programs have really brought a lot of our seniors out of social isolation and helpledj them work out and have a good time. They are constantly telling everyone about the great programs we are able to provide due to the AgeOptions [funding]. We were able to bring joy to one of our patrons who had become very lonely and now she lights up a room.

We love this program because there are plenty of opportunities for conversation while completing projects.






